



Walk around this sculpture and choose a section where different materials connect or attach in an intriguing way. Draw this part of the sculpture below.


Louise Nevelson Sky Cathedral's Presence 1

Draw one shape you find within Louise Nevelson's sculpture in the space below. Find another shape and draw it overlapping your first one. Repeat once more to form new layered shapes.




Marisol (Marisol Escobar)


Self-Portrait


Create your own woven line drawing inside the silhouette of Lenore Tawney's artwork below. Your lines may be vertical, horizontal, curvy, or form patterns.

Untitled (painting made for Spiral Exhibition, 1965)



Girl with Radish


What is happening in Marjorie Strider's artwork? What might this person be thinking? Fill in the bubble below to describe her thoughts.
