The Meyer Family


What do you notice about the people in this painting?

- Describe the scene in the background.
 Where might this be? How can you tell?
- Choose one person that stands out to you.
 Describe the clothes he or she is wearing.
 Look closely at the fabric. What colors has the painter Sargent used to create it? How do you think the fabric might feel?
- Describe the pose of the person you have chosen. Does he or she seem relaxed or uncomfortable? What makes you say so?
- What might your character be thinking based on his or her facial expression?

- Where do you notice shadows?


Sargent was known for leaving his brushwork visible.
