Musician/composer John Zorn and poet Kenneth Goldsmith will present an afternoon of musical collaborations inspired by Walter Benjamin's masterpiece, *The Arcades Project*. The event will feature readings by Goldsmith exploring the themes of prewar Europe and postwar New York alternating with Zorn compositions performed by a lineup including JACK Quartet, Peter Evans, Mark Feldman, Erik Friedlander, Ches Smith, Michael Nicolas, David Fulmer, and John Zorn himself.
