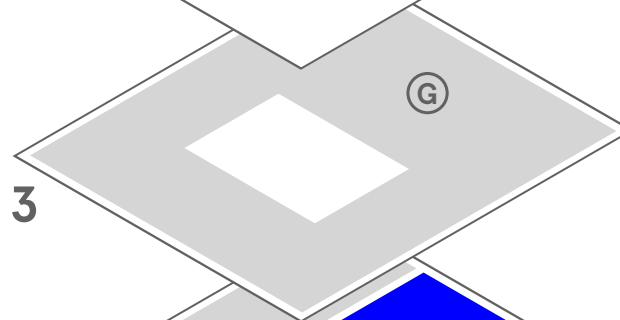
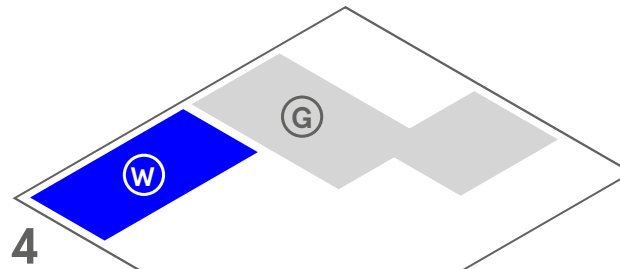
Hosting at the Jewish Museum

A HISTORIC TREASURE on Museum Mile, the Jewish Museum offers elegant, versatile venues for unforgettable private events. Originally the home of the Warburg family, this landmarked French-Gothic mansion was designed by celebrated architect C.P.H. Gilbert and completed in 1908. The Museum combines carefully preserved architectural details on the first two floors with newly renovated, state-of-the-art galleries and gathering spaces on the third and fourth floors.

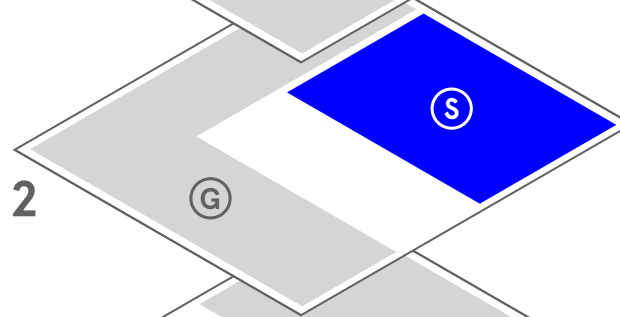




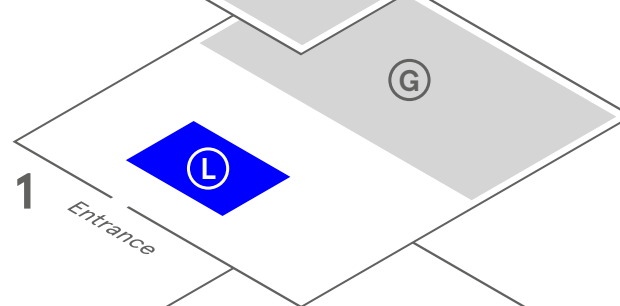

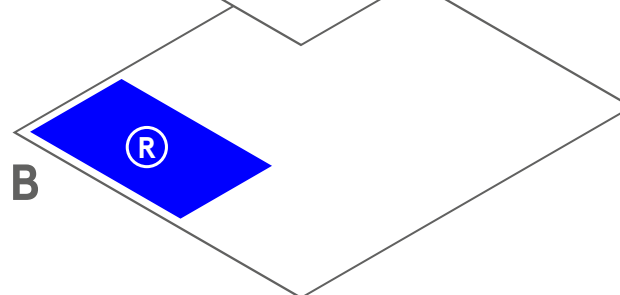

Scheuer Auditorium (Ballroom)



Scheuer Auditorium (Ballroom)

Located on Floor 2 of the Museum, Scheuer Auditorium features columns, moldings and stained-glass windows from the original Warburg Mansion interior.

As the largest entertainment space, Scheuer Auditorium is a flexible and elegant option for events with a band or DJ, private dinners, lectures, milestone birthdays, B'Nei Mitzvahs and small wedding receptions.

Capacity:

100 for a seated meal with a dancefloor

120 for a buffet-style meal; 150 for a seated meal

190 for auditorium-style seating

200 for a standing cocktail reception

Wilf Family Salon

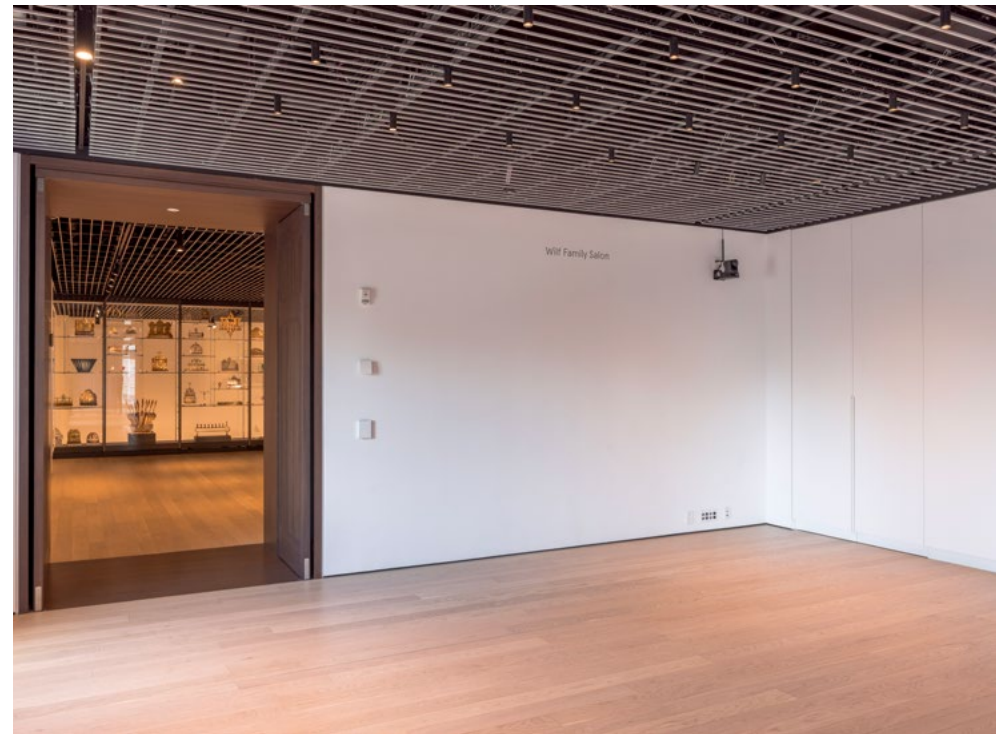
The Wilf Family Salon is the Museum's newest gathering space, featuring spectacular views of New York's Central Park and a striking mural by contemporary artist Talia Levitt. Located on Floor 4, the Salon is perfect for smaller cocktail parties and B'nei Mitzvah services, baby namings, board meetings and private meals. The Salon is flanked on the north side by the Museum's iconic Hanukkah Lamps installation, creating a natural opportunity to extend the visitor experience with private tours of the Floor 4 and Floor 3 collection exhibitions.

Capacity:

30 for a banquet-style dinner

60 for a seated event

80 for a standing cocktail reception

The main entrance to the Museum, Skirball Lobby features a magnificent ceiling and period columns that have been carefully preserved from the original Warburg Mansion entryway. This space is perfect for intimate gatherings, and can host a standalone reception or be combined with a private tour of the Museum's exhibitions or a larger dinner in the Scheuer Auditorium (Ballroom) upstairs.

As Skirball Lobby is publicly accessible, availability is subject to Museum operating hours.

Capacity:

30 for a seated event

75 for a standing cocktail reception

Lox is a modern gem tucked under the Museum's historic mansion home. With cozy banquette seating and a site-specific mural by artist Maira Kalman, the setting provides bespoke charm for private meals, Shabbat dinners and smaller seated parties. Enjoy updated takes on classic Jewish comfort food created by chef and restaurateur David Teyf and order from the Lox restaurant menu, or work with the catering team at Madison and Park Hospitality Group to accommodate larger events and more customized fare.

Capacity:

50 for a seated meal

60 for a standing reception



Private Gallery Access

The Museum's permanent collection and special exhibitions are available for viewing during private events. All event rates include access to the exhibitions during business hours or one exhibition for events held during non-operating hours. Additional exhibitions and docent/educator-led tours can also be added to event bookings.



Approved Kosher Caterers

Lox at the Jewish Museum (Madison and Park Hospitality Group) is the Museum's preferred choice for all event catering needs. With exclusive access to the Museum's kosher-certified dairy kitchen, Lox is uniquely positioned to provide high-quality and creative fare.

Clientele may also choose from a selection of additional Kosher-certified caterers. All approved caterers have worked in the Museum and can accommodate anything from simple luncheons to lavish dinners.

FAQs

How do I inquire about a date or venue space(s)?

To inquire about venue space(s) and date availability, please reach out to the Special Events team at rentals@thejm.org with the following information: desired date(s) and whether there is flexibility, event timing, guest count, event type, preferred space(s), A/V needs, and any additional details you wish to share.

How much will my event cost?

Once you have discussed the details of your event with a representative, you will receive a preliminary range of costs. The more details you are able to provide, the more precise the range will be. Estimated event costs include venue rental fees, labor and personnel costs, and any additional costs that might be incurred due to the size and scale of the event.

What's included?

Standard rental packages include expanded access for setup and breakdown, security and coat-check services, use of Museum furniture and white linens (30-inch round tables, 60-inch round tables, 6-foot rectangular tables, and chairs), Museum admission during opening hours or private access to one floor of galleries during events, and standard A/V.

Is a deposit required? Is my deposit refundable?

If you wish to confirm your date, a nonrefundable deposit equivalent to half of the total rental fee is required along with the signed contract and a certificate of insurance.

How can I arrange a site visit of the venue space(s) in which I am interested?

Visiting a potential event space is an important part of the event-planning process. The Museum is pleased to offer site visits by appointment only. Depending on the availability of the space(s) in which you are interested, visits are scheduled Monday through Friday, 10 am – 6 pm. To make an appointment, please email rentals@thejm.org.

Does the Jewish Museum have approved/required vendors?

The Jewish Museum has a list of approved certified kosher caterers. All other vendors are up to the discretion of the client, subject to Museum approval. Catering, additional furniture/event rentals, and other vendor needs are contracted and invoiced outside of the Museum.

Is parking available at the Jewish Museum?

There is no parking facility at the Jewish Museum; however, there are a number of parking garages in the area. The following parking garages offer discounted parking to Museum visitors. Tickets must be validated by the Jewish Museum admissions desk.

Impark:

40 East 89th Street (between Madison & Park Avenues)

Champion Parking:

60 East 90th Street (between Madison & Park Avenues)
